Library Proposition



In May 2014 the Chenango Valley community voted to support a proposition that provided funding to the Fenton Free Library.

According to New York State Education Law, libraries within the boundaries of a school district have the right to place a separate funding proposition on the district's ballot. The law provides this as a means for libraries to access community voters and levy taxes.

It is important to note that library funds and school district funds remain separate, and the school district does not have any role in funding, operations or management of the library.

The Chenango Valley Central School District budget vote on May 16, 2017 will include a proposition to increase funding for the Fenton Free Library from \$85,000 to \$115,000. The impact of that \$30,000 increase would be approximately \$0.04 (4 cents) per \$1,000 of assessed value. For a home assessed at \$100,000, this would result in an increase of approximately \$4 per year.

Bus Proposition



Voters will be asked to consider a proposition to purchase (2) 66-passenger buses at a cost not to exceed \$250,000.

Chenango Valley has a fleet of approximately 30 buses, with a long-range plan to replace an average of three buses each year as they reach 10 years or 100,000 miles.

This purchase plan is for diesel-fueled buses.

While we included the purchase of a propane bus in our 2016-17 transportation plan, we are delaying the purchase of any additional propane buses as we continue to research and monitor the environmental and financial impact. We also continue to investigate other alternative fuel source options.

Transportation aid reimbursement


Bus purchases, including finance costs, are aidable at the district's transportation aid ratio, which is increasing to approximately 80% beginning in 2017-18. This means that the district will be reimbursed for approximately 80% of the costs incurred through this bus purchase plan.

Annual Small Capital Outlay Project

Each year, our budget includes a \$100,000 "tranfer to capital" that enables the district to take advantage of a state reimursement program for smaller capital projects. This year, a \$100,000 project will result in a net cost of approximately \$16,600.

Based on our aid ratio, which is increasing to 83.4% this year, we receive a reimbursement in the following year on the final cost of a capital project of up to \$100,000. Doing this annually allows us to use the reimbursement to fund the next year's project.

This year, the focus of the project will be the pool, since it will already be shut down for other construction activities. A pool area is a harsh environment due to the chloramines in the air, which can negatively affect materials very quickly. The project work includes replacement of valves on the pool system piping, the addition of exhaust to the pool filter room, and replacement of corroding electrical devices. The project will also include replacement of the hot water heater breeching.



Message from the president and superintendent

We are pleased to present you with the 2017-2018 Chenango Valley Central School District budget proposal.

School districts statewide continue to be impacted by unfunded mandates, tax levy limits, escalating costs and more. While these factors are significant, it is important that we remain positive about our future and focused on the reason we're here: our students.

All students deserve a high-quality education that ensures they are college and career ready. At Chenango Valley, our consistently high test scores and graduation rates reflect a commitment to providing students with the education they deserve. Our mission and vision is to "inspire, engage, and empower" our students and "prepare our students for the challenges of life in the 21st century." In developing the budget, we used this mission as our guide, while giving careful consideration to all stakeholders.

The plan provides for continued support of instructional technology, particularly through our high school iPad program, which incorporates all students in grades nine through 12, and to remain focused on supporting educational programs in the area of STEM (science-technology-engineering-mathematics) in grades K-12.

Our proposed budget also enables us to maintain instructional integrity and effectiveness, and help students improve their academic standing through our Academic Intervention Services, and also helps us support our English Language Learners. No cuts to existing programs or extra-curricular activities are proposed.

The budget continues to include smaller capital projects that allow us to take advantage of significant state reimbursements that will be received in the following year. This means we'll be able to complete approximately \$100,000 in capital projects at a net cost of about \$16,600. (see article, page 2)

The tax levy limit law enacted in 2011 by New York State requires districts to apply an eight-step formula to determine the highest allowable tax levy increase a district can propose that will require approval of a simple majority (more than 50 percent) of voters. If districts choose to propose a tax levy increase above this calculated amount, a "super majority" of more than 60 percent of voters must approve the plan.

Chenango Valley's allowable tax levy increase (without requiring a super majority) for 2017-2018 is 1.38%, which is the increase we propose in this budget. This means we are proposing an increase of less than 2% in taxes to support the school budget as compared with the amount collected for the 2016-2017 school year.

We invite all residents to attend the annual budget hearing on Monday, May 3 at 6 p.m. in the Middle School library. The district budget vote and school board elections will be held from 12 noon to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, May 16 in the CV High School auditorium.

Please review the enclosed material, which includes the 2017-2018 budget presented in three components, information on the bus purchase proposition and Fenton Free Library proposition, and statements from our board of education candidates. 

Tax levy increase

The 2017-2018 proposed budget is supported by a total tax levy increase of 1.38% or \$257,091. Our total tax levy growth over the last for years is a TOTAL of 1.72%, or \$324,651.

Impact when Basic STAR is applied

The impact of this 1.38% increase on the annual tax bill of a home valued at \$100,000 would be approximately \$38 *before* any STAR savings is applied. Homeowners with Basic STAR will see an increase of approximately \$22 on a home valued at \$100,000.

Equalization rate impact

Every homeowner's tax bill is impacted by changes in equalization rates that are assigned by NYS to every town each summer prior to school tax bills being calculated. As a result of that change, each town in our school district will see a different impact on their tax bill depending on their town's change in equalization rate relative to other towns in the state.

Voter eligibility

To vote, you must be:

- 18 years of age or older
- · a U.S. citizen, and
- a resident of the school district for at least 30 days (proof of residency is required: NYS driver's license, sheriff's ID card, senior citizen ID card or utility bill indicating residency)

Absentee ballots

Absentee ballot applications may be obtained through District Clerk Susan Cirba, 762-6812. Voters must verify eligibility and provide an eligible reason for their inability to vote in person. Absentee ballot applications must be requested at least 7 days prior to the date of the vote, and the returned ballot must be received no later than the day before the vote. The district will automatically mail absentee ballots to voters listed as "permanently disabled" on the Board of Elections list. For more information, please call Susan Cirba at 762-6812.

What if the budget doesn't pass?

The board of education will either:

(1) make changes to the budget and hold a second vote; or (2) adopt a contingency budget. If a contingency budget is adopted, \$45,000 in equipment purchases would be eliminated and \$261,000 in other cuts would be made to the budget.

Capital Project Update


The final phase of the capital improvement project has begun, which will conclude the \$12.4 million project that was voted on in December 2014. To date there have been many great improvements to our facilities including renovations to multiple athletic fields, new playgrounds at Port Dickinson and Chenango Bridge, roof replacements, parking lot reconstruction, and many more.

Construction for the conclusion of the project began at Chenango Bridge on April 17, and includes asbestos abatement in the crawl-space, demolition in the kitchen, and creation of a temporary kitchen and serving line. Later in the school year, construction at Chenango Bridge will include the multi-purpose room, a new security office and secure vestibule, HVAC system improvements, fire alarm and PA systems replacement, and new camera system installation.

Construction at Port Dickinson will begin in the summer, and will include renovation of the kitchen and cafetorium space, HVAC system improvements, fire alarm and PA system replacements, installation of a new security office and secure vestibule, and new camera system.

Construction at the Middle School / High School will also occur over the summer, and includes new cameras, masonry restoration, pool lighting, and HVAC systems replacement.

The Chenango Valley Central School District anticipates conducting a construction project commencing on or about April 17, 2017. This project will be conducted at the following locations:

Port Dickinson Elementary School, 770 Chenango Street, Binghamton, NY 13901 Chenango Bridge Elementary School, 741 River Road, Binghamton, NY 13901 Chenango Valley Middle/High School, 221 Chenango Bridge Road, Binghamton, NY 13901 Chenango Valley CSD Bus Garage, 221 Chenango Bridge Road, Binghamton, NY 13901

The project will consist of the following:

Port Dickinson Elementary:

Project consists of cooling tower replacement, boiler replacement, make up air unit replacement, fire alarm system replacement, PA system replacement, kitchen and cafetorium renovations, creation of secure vestibule and associated office, and new camera system.

Middle/High School:

Project includes pool light fixture replacement, pool ventilation system replacement, and new camera system.

Chenango Bridge Elementary:

Project includes pavement reconstruction, HVAC system improvements, PA system replacement, fire alarm system replacement, kitchen renovation, multi-purpose room renovation, new security office and secure vestibule, and new camera system.

Bus Garage:

Project consists of new fueling station, new fuel monitoring system, new data connection from Middle/High School, and new camera system.

Pursuant to Education Commissioner's Regulation 155.5(d), the Chenango Valley Central School District will provide a safe school environment throughout this project, including an update of the school emergency plan to reflect any temporary exits or procedures needed as a result of the construction work at the school facilities. Fire drills will be held to familiarize students and staff with any temporary exits. The construction area will be separated from occupied areas of the building, all construction workers will be required to wear photo identification badges, and noise levels will be kept to a minimum while the building is occupied. All applicable federal and state rules and regulations will be strictly adhered to throughout the length of this project.

Public Notice

The Chenango Valley Central School District has completed the inspection of all schools and buildings to determine the condition of asbestos that is present, and whether any action is required to avoid potential health hazards for students, employees and visitors.

A management plan has been developed in accordance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), to ensure the continued provision and maintenance of a safe environment for students, employees and visitors. The management plan includes training of maintenance staff to prevent disturbance of asbestos, periodic re-inspection, surveillance, and limited abatement by trained personnel.

Please note that the comprehensive, triennial inspection occurs once every three years. A surveillance inspection of the asbestos-containing building materials occurs every six months, typically during the months of December and July. Monitoring of these building materials occurs on a continuing basis.


Interact Club helps community

Does Your middle school student have a smartphone?

If you have given or are just about to give your adolescent a smartphone, then it's an excellent time to establish ground rules for how your middle schooler is allowed to use that device. Here are six online safety tips for parents of middle school students and younger students too, courtesy of Stephen Balkam, founder and CEO of Family Internet Safety Institute.

- 1. Talk with your child. Conversation is key when it comes to online safety. Parents should expect that their middle schoolers will see or hear something you wish they wouldn't, and perhaps even do things you wish they wouldn't, so it's key to keep the lines of communication open, so you can use those as teachable moments.
- 2. Educate yourself. There are two easy ways to do this. Jump right in, by signing up for social media and other apps your middle schooler wants to use. And ask questions, such as "What is Instagram?" and "What is SnapChat, and what are your friends using it for?" This will help keep you updated on what your child is doing online.
- 3. Use parental controls and monitor your child's use of the device. Find out what parental control options are available for your child's smartphone device. Also be sure to check the settings on their apps --in general, the more private the better. Lastly, internet safety in middle school requires parents to be aware of how often their adolescent is using a screen.
- 4. Set ground rules. Establish a curfew (i.e. no electronics after 9 p.m.) and after curfew, all electronics are stashed away, not in the bedroom, and charged overnight. Follow up with consequences when rules are not followed.
- 5. Friend and follow, but don't stalk. Parents of middle schoolers should friend or follow their children online, but be upfront about it. If you are finding that they are making inappropriate posts, stay calm and use this as a teachable moment. Parents should also be aware that most social media platforms do not allow children under 13.
- 6. Most importantly, be a good digital role model. Be mindful of what you are posting as well. Remember that online safety for middle school starts at home.

Guidance

How to LISTEN so you kids will talk!

As parents, knowing how your child(ren)'s day went and what is on their mind is so important. With that, how do we get past the answers of "good, not much, nothing" that can be the typical response from your child. Here are tips to use.

Be available for your children

- Notice times when your kids are most likely to talk for example, at bedtime, before dinner, in the car and be available.
- Start the conversation; it lets your kids know you care about what's happening in their lives.
- 15 minutes Find time each week for a one-on-one activity with each child, and avoid scheduling other activities during that time.
- Learn about your children's interests for example, favorite music and activities and show interest in them.
- Initiate conversations by sharing what you have been thinking about rather than beginning a conversation with a question.



Let your kids know you're listening

- When your children are talking about concerns, stop whatever you are doing and listen.
- Express interest in what they are saying without being intrusive.
- Listen to their point of view, even if it's difficult to hear.
- Let them complete their point before you respond.
- Repeat what you heard them say to ensure that you understand them correctly.

Respond in a way your children will hear

- Soften strong reactions; kids will tune you out if you appear angry or defensive.
- Express your opinion without putting down theirs; acknowledge that it's okay to disagree.
- Resist arguing about who is right. Instead say, "I know you disagree with me, but this is what I think."
- Focus on your child's feelings rather than your own during your conversation.

Remember:

- Ask your children what they may want or need from you in a conversation, such as advice, simply listening, help in dealing with feelings or help solving a problem.
- Kids learn by imitating. Most often, they will follow your lead in how they deal with anger, solve problems and work through difficult feelings.
- Talk to your children don't lecture, criticize, threaten or say hurtful things.
- Kids learn from their own choices. If the consequences are not dangerous, don't feel you have to step in.
- Realize your children may test you by telling you a small part of what is bothering them. Listen carefully to what they say, encourage them to talk and they may share the rest of the story.

Parenting is hard work

Listening and talking is the key to a healthy connection between you and your children. But parenting is hard work and maintaining a good connection with teens can be challenging, especially since parents are dealing with many other pressures. If you are having problems over an extended period of time, you might want to consider consulting with a mental health professional to find out how they can help.

Full STEAM Ahead

CV has been very busy with STEAM activities this spring. A group of students gave a presentation to the Board of Education, demonstrating their biomimicry projects, utensils made from found materials, and Scratch Jr. coding projects.

Our High School STEAM Club students recently unveiled an augmented reality sandbox they built that uses an XBOX Kinnect Sensor to create a topographic map over the sandbox. As the sand is moved or manipulated, the map adjusts to the new elevations; creating mountains, valleys, and bodies of water.



The students worked in teams to create vehicles from our Lego Mindstorms to meet such challenges as following the line and using a forklift. They showed so much growth from last year. In our elementary and middle school classes, students have continued to work through engineering tasks and the design process. Second-graders have been learning to use our Bee Bots as an introduction to robotics. Seventh-graders also worked through the design process to create a container to solve the problem of clutter on their dresser. Finally, our High School production systems class implemented a production line to create marble racers.
