On Tuesday, December 5, 2017 from noon - 9:00 p.m. in the Chenango Valley High School Auditorium, community members in the Chenango Valley Central School District will have the opportunity to vote on proposed improvements to the district's facilities in a public referendum. The proposed capital improvements project has been structured to address top priority capital improvements that include renovations, building system upgrades, and site work. The estimated total cost for this project will be \$15 million, **with a local tax increase of \$0**. This project was designed to maintain a consistent tax effort for CV taxpayers.

Important Winter Weather Closing/Delay/Early Dismissal Information

With winter weather approaching, please review our school district's closing, delay, and early dismissal procedures.

When considering snow, ice, and other weather-related delays, contact is made with local town highway departments, input from the National Weather Service is considered, and discussions are held with our transportation department and other area school districts.

With a one or two-hour delay schedule, your child's school day will begin one or two hours after the regular start time. Dismissal times will remain the same.

With a two-hour delay schedule, there will be no pre-kindergarten classes.

When school is closed due to inclement weather, there will be no extracurricular activities. This includes all meetings, practices, and contests.

New this year is the option of utilizing a three-hour delay schedule. In the event a three-hour delay schedule is utilized, your child's school day will start three hours after the usual start time with dismissal times staying the same. A three-hour delay schedule would be utilized only if weather conditions forecasted indicate a significant improvement that would allow road crews the time needed to make our roadways safe for travel. Additionally, a three-hour delay may assist us in preventing changes to planned vacation days already on our school calendar.

Notifications for delays, closings, and early dismissals are shared with local media and sent via Ed Alert (see "Emergency Alert System" article on page 2 of this Newsreader on how to sign up for this service). Notifications are also posted on our website.

As always, the safety and security of our staff and students is our top priority, and we greatly appreciate your continued cooperation and understanding as we head into the winter season.


Emergency Alert System

The district uses an automated system to quickly send messages to parents/guardians in the event of a school or district emergency. For typical school opening delays and closings, messages will be sent in the form of an email and/or text to your cell phone. To receive messages, you will need to have an account on our district website:

1. Go to www.cvcسد.stier.org.
2. Select "Public Login" at the top right-hand corner of the page (black bar).
3. Log in and/or create a new account by choosing "Register New User".
4. Select the notification preferences you would like to receive: Emergency Alerts, Athletics, etc. Choose one or more schools from the list to receive notifications pertaining just to that school. To receive notifications for district-wide emergencies, which include weather-related school closings, select "Emergency Alerts/Closing and Delay".

We encourage you to check and make sure that you're signed up. If your contact information has changed, please update your contact information in the system as needed to ensure you receive notifications.

Please Note: In order to expand our capacity to communicate with our families in an unexpected emergency situation, we are going to pull lists of contact information from our student management system in order to make phone contact. We are going to utilize the voice calling feature of our system, sometimes called 'robocall'. This feature allows us to expand our reach to include landlines and to put more information into an alert than a text message may allow. In order to help verify the accuracy of the new lists pulled from the student management system, we are going to send a test call over the winter break. For typical closings and delays, we will continue to use the current Ed Alert procedures outlined above. It has been a very busy month since our last Newscaster edition. Our committees have been meeting regularly. Our Board of Education has six committees. They include Athletics, Budget, Audit & Fiscal Oversight, Building & Grounds, Educational Excellence, Policy and Transportation. All of the committee meetings follow the guidelines in the Open Meetings Law which means that we welcome the public to sit in on them. Also, although not required, most of our CV committees include a time for the public to speak and share their thoughts and ideas. Please be aware that no decisions are made at these meetings. They are simply sessions in which we can delve into matters more deeply than we could at a full school board meeting. Information is then conveyed to the entire board at the monthly meeting.

Our district has also been busy developing a capital project that is innovative, practical, and fiscally responsible. When developing such a project, we always make sure we keep in mind what is best for students, staff and families. We are thrilled at being able to enhance our programs by refurbishing classrooms and libraries, updating gymnasiums and the CB nurse’s office, adding outside facilities, and expanding our bus garage. We will also be looking to do extensive work on our infrastructure and making sure we update our lighting and other areas so as to save energy and keep costs down. A full breakdown can be found on our website. All of the work in our proposed capital project will be done using state aid, capital reserves, and a scheduled reduction in local share -- and will have a zero impact on our net local share. In other words, our students will be educated and participate in activities in a state-of-the-art environment, and your taxes will not go up. Please come out to vote on December 5.

As always, we encourage everyone to attend our monthly board meetings, and we thank you for the opportunity to serve the district.

CV Alumni, Community Members Honored for Accomplishments

On October 27, Chenango Valley Central School District was happy to welcome this year's Chenango Valley Hall of Fame honorees for a day and night of recognition for their noteworthy accomplishments.

The 2017 honorees of distinction included CV alumni Capt. Michelle D. Morse, SC, USN (Class of 1987) who has received a number of prestigious recognitions for her naval duties and reported as Commanding Officer for NAVSUP Fleet Logistics Center San Diego in August 2016; **Les Meadowcroft (Class of 1988)** who has worked to support the adoption of minimally invasive surgery techniques and technology that have become the standard of care in human medicine, and is currently the president and founder of VetOvation, Inc. that allows for minimally invasive surgery of animals as well; and **Linda Hall Trusky (Class of 1980)** who has served in community organizations and in 2013 purchased the local eatery My Uncle's Place with her brother. She has sponsored many community events, hosted CV alumni and class reunion events, and donated to community fundraisers. **This year's distinguished community members were Larry and Nancy Moss.** Nancy graduated from CV in 1962. Larry and Nancy have enjoyed living in the district community and being foster/adoptive parents to many children over the past four decades. They still have two children in the district.

The day was filled with wonderful recognition events at each school. It kicked off with honorees Les Meadowcroft and Captain Michelle Morse meeting the high school students who would be their guides and provide their introductions at events. The next stop was Port Dickinson Elementary. PD students provided a warm welcome with a morning assembly, which also included a musical number from Mr. Vanderslice's HS Select Choir. At a Chenango Bridge Elementary assembly afterwards, students asked the honorees some insightful questions including "How do you think going to CV impacted the decision of who you are?" A luncheon at the middle/high school, which also included some former honorees, was followed by individual MS/HS classroom visits for each honoree. These visits, geared towards the honoree's career and interest field, provided great inspiration for students. Mr. Meadowcroft encouraged students to challenge the status quo. French Students Explore Broome County and Beyond

Chenango Valley was excited to give a welcoming "Bonjour!" to 31 French students and three teachers from La Borde Basse, a high school in Castres, France! The group arrived at CV on October 13 to spend almost two weeks with members of the CV French exchange. CV and La Borde Basse have been participating in the exchange for almost 25 years, and have been recognized by the U. S. Department of State for running such a successful program. The exchange occurs every two years.

The focus of this year's exchange visit was getting to know Binghamton and the Southern Tier. Highlights for the French students included Binghamton Mayor David raising the French flag at City Hall and participating in a question and answer session, spending a day at Roberson learning about and participating in activities illustrating the history of industry in Broome County, hiking in Ithaca and touring Cornell University, spending a day at Binghamton University, and watching glass being made at the Corning Museum of Glass. A day was also spent at both Port Dickinson and Chenango Bridge Elementary, where the exchange students taught a little French vocabulary and answered elementary students' questions about their home country and culture.

The CV families who hosted the students provided many valuable cultural experiences such as spiedies and traditional Thanksgiving dinner tastings, pumpkin carving, apple picking, tie-dyeing of t-shirts, and so much more! Many thanks go to the CV families and students who went above and beyond to give the French students a memorable experience.

In the spring, 25 Chenango Valley students will travel to France to visit Paris, along with their French correspondents and their town of Castres.

CV French teacher Mrs. Amber Henyan, also known as Madame Henyan, is the director of the American part of the exchange. Members of the exchange would like to thank the CV administration and Board of Education for their continued support of this wonderful program, as well as the faculty and staff who have helped in so many ways to give the French students and teachers such a warm CV welcome.

Full STEAM Ahead


Tinker Town and Tinker Lab are open at Port Dickinson and Chenango Bridge. These include open times in our STEAM classrooms where students can come down and explore their own projects and interests. For students who need an idea to get started, there are project starter ideas and design challenges to get them going.

Our first graders at Port Dickinson recently had their first design challenge. They were asked to create new furniture for the bears in Goldilocks and the Three Bears. Second grade had to design some new silverware that actually works using certain materials.

At Chenango Bridge, our third graders had a yummy engineering lesson. They learned about the history and science behind popcorn and were challenged to build a popcorn container. Fourth graders have been recreating famous buildings using only three types of materials. Imagine St. Basil's Cathedral made out of scrap paper and cups! Our fifth graders have tapped into their inner designers and created shoes made out of newspaper!

In the middle school, eighth graders designed, built, and launched water bottle rockets. They studied different types of rockets, rocket components and their purposes, and how rockets fly. Now they are learning how to correctly and safely use tools and machines in preparation for our cutting board manufacturing project.

Some of our high school students recently toured Raymond Corporation to learn about possible careers in the industry. Also in our high school, our STEAM Club is getting ready for their first VEX competition in December. They will be traveling to Tioga to compete on a Saturday. This is their first competition with this type of robot -- and we wish them luck!




CV Students Put STEAM Skills to the Test in "Engineering Day 2017"

MS Guidance Helps Students Explore College & Career Opportunities



The CV Middle School Guidance Office has been busy with a focus on college and career readiness. We believe that it is never too early to help students think about their career options and furthering their education.

Each grade level had activities specifically designed for their level of development. In the sixth grade, Mrs. Lally helped students identify their personality color. The students then participated in activities that linked their color to potential careers. They also researched some post-high school educational opportunities by looking through college brochures and pamphlets.

Seventh graders completed a week-long unit with Mrs. Lally that included completing a self-evaluation and career exploration guide, researching a career of interest on the “Career Cruising” program, and creating a banner of information about a college that offers a major that could lead to that career.

Mrs. Samson took the eighth grade students on virtual campus visits and had students research the colleges attended by CV staff. On October 23, the eighth graders went on a field trip to visit Binghamton University. It was a busy morning as students heard from a college admissions representative and enjoyed a tour of the beautiful campus given by current BU students. It was wonderful opportunity for our students to experience a college campus firsthand.

During eighth grade FACS, students continued to explore colleges and careers using the “Career Cruising” program. They completed a research project, practiced filling out job applications, and participated in a mock interview.

The entire middle school was involved in this month-long project that also featured college bingo, an inspirational wall of college information, and a day for everyone to wear clothing from their favorite university. We hope that these activities have sparked conversations at home about future career options and the importance of higher education. Parents can help to encourage their children to explore career choices, and they also have unique insight into the interests, values, and abilities that inform those choices. Guidance

10 Ways to Help Your Child Handle School *STRESS*



Between schoolwork, homework, standardized tests and test anxiety, after-school activities and bullying, kids are super stressed out. In fact, more than a third of parents said their kids were under a ton of school stress, according to a recent NPR poll.

Kids who are under stress will have changes in mood or behavior. They will likely be irritable, cry more, withdraw from activities, express uncertainty, or have negative self-talk. He or she might complain about headaches and stomachaches or have changes in sleep and appetite. Kids under stress also have problems getting ready for school and may even refuse to go.

If your child is dealing with school stress, here are 10 ways you can help him or her cope:

1. Stop the chaos

“A rushed child is never a calm child.” Chaotic mornings also set the tone for the day, so leave enough time and make sure everything they need is ready to go.

2. Get more sleep

Kids who get enough sleep are likely to be less irritable and better able to handle school stress.

3. Talk

If you suspect your kid is stressed or is being bullied, open the lines of communication by asking about his or her day and challenges.

4. Practice relaxation

Deep breathing, progressive muscle relaxation, and positive thinking are proven ways to reduce stress that also work for kids. Writing daily affirmations to your child can help as well.

5. Cut down on extras

As a nation, we’ve come to believe that busy equals happy. Keeping busy can be an unhealthy way to cope with life’s challenges, and the philosophy has been transferred to our kids. Too many after-school activities means less time for homework. If needed, try cutting some out and using dinner time to de-stress and bond as a family.

6. Connect

Talk to school staff and other parents about what they see so you can keep track of how he or she is handling school.

7. Model coping strategies

Don’t just talk the talk, but walk the walk! If you can’t handle your stress, your child will never learn to either. So, the next time you have a tough day at work, it’s okay to tell your kids why you were upset – but share positive strategies that you are using to handle the stressful situations.

8. Don’t criticize

Even if you disagree, never talk negatively about homework or teachers in front of your child because it creates fear. “They’re already feeling stress, so you need to be the calming force. Schedule a parent-teacher conference to share your concerns with the teacher instead.”

9. Limit technology

Kids spend more than seven hours a day using technology. That can lead to stress. So, have your kids unplug by putting limits on tech time, and spend more time being active as a family.

10. Get help

Remember, if school stress is affecting your child’s ability to function, it’s important to talk to a counselor who can help your child cope.


CV Brings Cheer to STAC Championship


Fall Activities Fall into Educational Fun

Red Poppies Worn to Show Appreciation to Veterans



According to the National Constitution, all four aspects should be equally weighted to determine membership. Some people think membership is based solely on grades, which is not the case. The process is rather involved and takes a great deal of careful consideration and thought from the Faculty Council. NHS looks for students who are of high caliber not only in their schoolwork, but in their ways of being true leaders and contributors to the community. In addition, their character should reflect high motivation, sincerity, honesty, and exemplary behavior.

National Honor Society ranks as one of the oldest and most prestigious national organizations for high school students. Chapters exist in more than 60 percent of the nation's high schools, and millions of students have been selected for membership since 1921.

While it was easy to find judges, all of these tasty sandwiches made the judging itself quite hard! "The CV Melt" was declared the winner! Great job to all involved!


