STEAM Night is a wonderful event to celebrate the areas of **S**cience, **T**echnology, **E**ngineering, **A**rt and **M**ath! STEAM Night will take place February 28, 2019. Most activities will be held in the Chenango Valley Middle School.

The night will kick off with CV Middle School Cardboard Boat Races at the middle school/high school pool. Boats line up at 4:30 p.m., judging begins at 4:45 p.m. and races start at 5:00 p.m. STEAM Night activity stations will get underway at 6:00 p.m. and continue until 7:30 p.m. Students in grades K-6 can participate in a variety of interactive STEAM and learning activities. Those who attend can also watch some Rube Goldberg machines in action, learn from our high school chemistry students, speak with representatives from local businesses and universities, and view sixth grade science projects. *You don't want to miss this exciting, free and educational event!*

Capital Project Update

The Phase 2 portion of the 2018 Capital Improvement Project, which includes extensive refurbishment of both Chenango Bridge Elementary and Port Dickinson Elementary, has received approval from the State Education Department. With approval in hand, the project was immediately put out to public bid as required by NY State Municipal Law. The bidding environment was very favorable and the costs came in lower than anticipated, which will allow for some additional work to occur. Most of the contractors are local to the Binghamton area, so the work is also helping to support the local community.

Now that the bidding is complete, more detailed planning with a team of district officials, architects/engineers, a clerk of the works, and contractors will be occurring over the next several months to get the actual construction started. The anticipated construction schedule can be seen in the image to the right.

In order to accomplish this schedule, both elementary schools will be closed for specific periods of time. For the entire 2019-2020 school year, Chenango Bridge Elementary students will be moved to the St. Francis school building. In the beginning of the school year, Port Dickinson Elementary will be housed in the current Chenango Bridge Elementary (741 River Road) building. In January 2020, PDE students and staff are anticipated to move back to the renovated Port Dickinson Elementary building at 770 Chenango St. CBE students and staff are anticipated to return to the Chenango Bridge Elementary building at 741 River Road in the fall of 2020. By emptying the buildings, construction will occur year-round, instead of only during summer breaks, which is another reason for the good bids we received. We are excited for our students and staff to experience beautiful new learning environments throughout both buildings, once construction is complete.



Board of Education President's Message

I hope by the time you are reading this the weather has warmed up! The brutal cold outside hasn't stopped our students from doing what they do best: playing, performing, practicing and, most importantly, learning. There are a plethora of opportunities to stay involved and motivated in the winter, thanks to our dedicated staff and supportive taxpayers.

At the November 2018 board meeting, I presented a CV Board of Education Strategic Plan. We are currently in the needs assessment phase. This is a process to determine our needs or gaps between our current conditions and desired conditions (or wants, if you will). We decided to research our current state of being by surveying a variety of stakeholders (instructional leaders, students, administrators, board members and community partners) using a SWOT assessment. This type of assessment asks participants to comment on the following:

- · Strengths: Superior internal capabilities Should be capitalized on and replicated as much as possible
- Weaknesses: Internal areas that prevent us from achieving goals and meeting student needs
- Opportunities: External trends we have little control over Represent opportunities and should be used to improve services or productivity
- Threats: External events, current and pending, that must be considered when creating goals

We have an ad hoc committee who will then review the results, in an open meeting, and begin to develop district goals and, ultimately, SMART objectives. Dr. Gill and his team will then develop action plans. We have decided, as a group, to take on this task and we all recognize the importance of working together throughout the process.

As we navigate this process, we will be using what we learn to help create the 2019-2020 budget. Although it will be a couple of months before the New York State Budget will be passed (so we will not officially know the implications it will have on us locally), we must start preparing with the information we do have, and historical and data-based projections. Our first budget workshop will take place on February 25, 2019 at 6:00 p.m. in the MS/HS library. It is an open meeting and we invite you all to attend. (*Please see page 4 for additional budget workshop dates*).

Chenango Valley High School Student Accepted into U.S. Senate Page Program

This spring, Chenango Valley High School junior Katerina Retzlaff will spend a majority of her time frequenting the headquarters of our nation's House of Representatives and Senate, the United States Capitol Building. Her ambitious journey was prompted by an earlier visit to the location.



"A few years ago, I was on vacation in D.C., visiting the Capitol, and saw young people around," said Retzlaff. "When I asked a volunteer what they were doing, they told me about the Page Program."

With her interest sparked, Retzlaff researched more on the U.S. Senate Page Program and learned about the qualifications to become a Page, a non-partisan federal employee who serves the Senate. When the time came, she applied to be one herself.

"A lot of people said I didn't have a chance to get in," said Retzlaff. "I didn't let that stop me and now I'm going to D.C."

Sponsored by U.S. Senator Charles Schumer, Retzlaff made her way to Washington, D.C. in late January to serve in the program for a little over four months.

"I'm a little nervous, since this is the longest time I've ever been away from my parents, but I'm excited to meet new people and for the opportunities and connections you can make," Retzlaff said before she left. "So, overall, I'm very excited."

Serving as one of 30 Pages in the prestigious program this term, Katerina will attend the U.S. Senate Page School on weekday mornings, followed directly by work in the Capitol. She will play an important role in the day-to-day operations of the Senate, such as helping to prepare the Senate Chamber for sessions.

"Basically, we'll help things run smoothly," said Retzlaff.

Retzlaff said she's looking forward to the experience of working firsthand with the U.S. government. With senior year and college applications approaching in the fall, she hopes it could also help to narrow down her future aspirations.

"I'm thinking of political science, but not sure what I want to do," said Retzlaff. "I want to see what interests me the most."

Chenango Valley High School Counselor Karen Mullins and Principal Jennifer Ostrander believe Katerina's sense of determination will take her far.

"I was happy to recommend Katerina," said Mullins. "She had the courage to step out of the box for a very competitive position and didn't let the competition discourage her, but instead used it to motivate her."

"We were so thrilled hear that Katerina was chosen to participate in this program. It is rare for a high school student to have such an immersive experience in the workings of our government," said Ostrander. "This will certainly shape her as not only a student, but as a citizen and future voter. We're all so proud of Katerina and her hard work!"

'Warrior Learners' Discusses Promoting Student Success, Provides Mid-Year Check-In

Chenango Valley Director of Special Education Tara Williams Whittaker led a "Warrior Learners" workshop on "Supporting Students to Promote Success, Looking at the Whole Child" on December 10.

This workshop had teachers and teaching assistants explore topics including the benefits of a growth mindset to help students embrace challenges as opportunities and grow as learners. Participants also examined behaviors that can make an impact on student success and identified strategies/interventions to support behaviors in order to improve success.

In addition, those who attended the workshop analyzed New York State social emotional learning goals and their corresponding benchmarks. Each participant selected one goal and benchmark to use in their classroom this school year to help promote student achievement and school connectedness.

On January 14, Chenango Valley Assistant Superintendent Michelle Feyerabend led a "Warrior Learners" workshop which incorporated a mid-year check-in on what newer staff members have learned so far from the program, as well as what they would like to learn in the future. Discussion included a review of what participants have been able to implement in their classrooms, and additional topics such as lesson planning. Participants also had the opportunity to share any questions they might have and talk about how the district can continue to provide assistance through programs such as "Warriors Learners."

The goal of "Warrior Learners" workshops is to provide various support and mentorship resources for elementary and secondary teachers and teaching assistants, especially those who are newer to the district, throughout the school year.





Attention Student Athletes

As you know, the NCAA has established eligibility rules related to participating in Division I and II college athletics. Should you be considering athletics in college, it is absolutely imperative that you notify your school counselor now. Students are required to take 16 core subject courses. The NCAA does not use elective courses to complete the 16.

To participate at the Division I or II level, you must also register with the NCAA Clearinghouse by going to <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u>. Once you have registered, it will prompt you to let the guidance office know, so we can submit a transcript. Finally, you must submit your SAT or ACT scores to the NCAA Eligibility Center directly from the testing agency in order to certify the student-athlete's initial eligibility. All test scores are required to be sent.

Five Mistakes Students Make When Picking a College

From "Link for Counselors" - This information was from an article published by Jill Haley on the Union's website. She is a retired high school counselor, who now works as an independent college counselor. There are some common mistakes that students make when picking a college. Here are five common ones:

- 1. Not doing enough research: Considering that the cost of a four-year college can be as much as purchasing a small home, some students do very little research before accepting an offer of admission. They should look at the college website and talk to admission reps before making that final decision. They should never make a decision without visiting the college first. Most colleges have Admitted Student Days in the spring. These open houses focus on incoming freshmen and often include overnight stays in the dorms to give students a real feel for the campus.
- 2. Not knowing the true cost to attend: This is a big one. Accepting an offer of admission and assuming they will make it all work can be a huge mistake. They should look closely at the financial aid award letter. Most colleges "package" loans within their offers. Taking out too many loans can put a student in debt for 20 or more years. Most schools should have a "net college price calculator" on their site. This should help you make an apples-to-apples comparison between schools.
- **3. Assuming location is everything:** Initially, students invariably put colleges on their list based on location. Anywhere near a beach is popular, but they are also often the most difficult to get into. Some of the best colleges are located away from the coasts, and are less selective because of their location. After all, students are so busy most of the time, they hardly ever make it to the beach. It is the opportunities and connections that a student participates in, and makes the most out of, that can affect their overall experience.
- 4. Listening to other people: Students often take colleges off their list because they hear from a friend, or a boyfriend's mother, that they know a student who hated the college. Yes, it does happen that someone has a bad experience, but that does not mean every student will. It is important to make a decision based on what the college can offer, not what someone else thinks.
- 5. Thinking that rankings matter: Many students still pay way too much attention to the rankings. Just because a college rejects over 90 percent of their students, doesn't mean it is THE best college to attend. What matters is if it is the best college for each student. Does it offer the right majors, extracurriculars or financial aid? This is much more important than where it is ranked by U.S. News and World Report. There is no evidence that attending the most highly ranked college assures success in later life.

Information for Parents: Course Scheduling 2019-20

It is the time of year when the high school counselors are working with your children to get them ready for the 2019-2020 school year. We have been meeting with our students one-on-one since October to complete individual planning sheets. One common theme covered in planning is talking about available course options. We encourage our students to take challenging courses and try to be thoughtful about how their choices will benefit them in the college selection process and in life.

The scheduling process includes going into English classes, where a presentation and overview of options are again covered. Students will all have a copy of their planning sheet and will add their classes online, via their Chromebook. We will provide parents with a copy of the courses their children selected by including them with a five-week report or quarter report card in May. Please encourage your son or daughter to bring this home.

Checklist Students can use One Week Prior to Taking or Retaking the SAT Test

Peterson's put together a quick checklist students can use before taking the SAT test:

- 1 Week Out Step 1: Take a full practice test. There are many available online.
- 3-5 Days Out Step 2: Final Review Now that you've taken a full practice test, go over any areas you aren't completely confident in. This may mean
 looking over the material from your textbooks or study guides, or going over practice questions that focus on the subject you're looking to get a bit
 more review in.
- 2 Days Out Step 3: Handle Any Logistics Plan the trip to the testing location. Make sure you have plenty of time to get there 15 minutes prior to the appointed time. Make sure you have reliable transportation locked up. Print your registration ticket and have a photo ID. If you feel the need for a last-minute review, limit it to two hours so you remain fresh.
- 1 Day Out Step 4: Last Minute Details Now is the time to let your brain take a breather before the test don't overload yourself with more studying! Be confident in the work you have done. Pack your bag for the next day. Bring No. 2 pencils, your registration ticket, photo ID, approved calculator with batteries, a watch to time yourself, a sweater (if you think you might want it), water and snacks. Relax, set an alarm (or alarms) and get a good night's sleep.
- Test Day Step 5: A Few Reminders Now comes the time to put all of your hard work, both from your studying and from your schooling to date, to the test. Remember to pace yourself. Be confident in your efforts to learn the material.

Our students (and faculty/staff) attend our "PD Morning Program." In this program, our students are learning KELSO's Choices, as well as how to treat others kindly. We incorporate social/emotional learning standards into our "Warrior STRONG" initiative.

The success of our school and students is directly correlated to the positive connections and communication we have between home and school. Attendance in school matters every day. 
Interactive Map Teaches about Solar System
