If you took the PSAT in October, you were notified through your email that your score report was ready. If you didn't provide an email, your score report is also available on-line. So, what should you do next? Create a College Board account at **studentscores.collegeboard.org**. Then create a Khan Academy account at **satpractice.org** and link College Board and Khan Academy accounts for free to obtain personalized practice for the SAT. Khan Academy is a great free tool offered by the College Board to help you prep for the SAT. They offer free practice tests and activities to get you ready for the SAT. There are other career tools available as well, like Big Future and RoadTrip Nation via your online score report. See your counselor with questions!

College Planning Timeline

JUNIOR YEAR

OCTOBER Take PSAT

MARCH Sign up for courses. Keep in mind that colleges look for challenging class schedules. Do SAT Prep.

Take SAT School Day at CV or register for the May SAT

APRIL Register for June ACT, if interested.

Talk with your school counselor to about college. Start the college search process.

MAY Take the SAT, if needed. Begin making a preliminary list of colleges which are of interest by looking at

colleges' websites. Begin visiting colleges while classes are still in session.

JUNE Take ACT, if interested

JULY-AUG. Visit Colleges.

SENIOR YEAR

SEPT. Make an appointment to meet with your school counselor to finish your college search and make a list of

colleges you would like to apply to.

Visit colleges; set up tours. Meet with admissions representatives who come to school.

Start asking teachers, employer, school counselors, and club advisors for letters of recommendation. Find out which tests you need (ACT, SAT) to get into the colleges you are applying to and make

arrangements to take those tests in October or November

OCTOBER Take SAT/ACT

Begin filling out college applications- Make an appointment with your school counselor if you have any

questions.

Attend college fairs

If you are applying "early decision" or "early action", you should complete and submit applications now. Work on your application essays; you may want an English teacher or school counselor to review them.

Submit a FAFSA®: Students will be able to file a FAFSA if available

NOV. Finalize your applications and submit them. Attend financial aid night

DEC./JAN. Send applications if you haven't already done so. Start checking out scholarship opportunities!

FEB. Check with your school counselor if you need mid-year grades sent to colleges

APRIL Schools will be notifying you about your acceptances. You will want to make your final decision and send

in your deposit by their deadline if you plan on attending their college. Be sure to notify those schools you are not going to attend. Schools will notify you about your financial aid packages. You should compare the

financial aid offers you receive.

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Advice to students	Clean up your	Social Media accounts!!!!!
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Students today have grown up with social media. They typically have accounts on Snap Chat, Twitter, Instagram, TikTok and many others that have popped up. There is a downside though to having all these accounts. It makes it easier for admissions officers to do their own sleuthing about potential students. A recent study by Kaplan showed 40% of admissions officers currently check the social media accounts of applicants. Students brazen enough to post pictures of them smoking, drinking or doing other nefarious things do so at their own risk. It could be the difference between getting accepted or rejected to their college of choice.

Athletes are at particular risk as many coaches are now using social media in their recruitment of athletes. Many athletes receive full or partial scholarships so posting the wrong thing could cost your student's big time. There are countless stories of athletes being expelled from college for getting caught doing things they shouldn't be doing so it is more important than ever for students to create a positive impression with their social media as coaches may not extend that scholarship offer if they see something that might concern them about the student's future behavior.

So how can you avoid issues? Post positive images of who you are. Post pictures with your friends, family and engaging in school activities and sports. Post about your passions, but to stay away from anything that can be construed as controversial or confrontational.

Social media is a great way to engage with colleges of interest by liking their pages and following their blogs to get updated information on a regular basis, but keep in mind it makes it easier for personnel of those colleges to check on you as well.
