Let's Celebrate Our Teachers!



Want a fun and inexpensive way to support native plants and flowers? Try making seed balls with your family!

Materials

Clay (available from craft stores) Compost or potting soil Seeds



Instructions

Divide your materials so you have: 5 parts clay

1 part compost/potting soil

- 1 part seeds
- Combine the clay and compost. Add a little water if your mixture is dry. The mixture should be moist but not dripping wet - similar to the consistency of cookie dough.
- Add the seeds to the clay and compost/soil. Thoroughly work the materials together with your hands.
- Shape the mixture into balls about the size of a golf ball.
- You can plant the seed balls while they're still moist, or allow them to air dry.
- Toss or place your seed balls directly onto bare soil. As long as they are watered (either manually or by rain), the clay will break down and the seeds will grow.

Seeds of native wildflowers work especially well in seed balls because they are adapted for your climate. These plants also provide a food source for local pollinators.
