ATTENIDANCE MATTERS

At Chenango Valley Central School District, students are our top priority. To help all students achieve success, one of our core focuses is on attendance.



Important Facts Relating to Attendance:

- 1. Research shows higher attendance links to higher student success.
- 2. The New York State Education Department is tracking attendance including chronic absenteeism. Chronic absenteeism is defined as a student missing at least ten (10) percent of enrolled school days. Important to note: Chronic absenteeism includes both excused and unexcused absences.
- If your child is sick or late, please remember the following district procedures:

 A parent/guardian must call the school attendance office if a student will be absent from school.
 A written excuse must be provided by the parent/guardian upon the student's return to school.
 Students arriving late with a legal reason must provide a note from a parent/guardian or the parent/guardian must call the attendance office.
- 4. Please refer to a document titled "When to Keep a Child Home with Illness" on our district website or contact the school nurse if you have questions about whether you should keep your child home or send them to school. Please keep your child home and/or contact their health care provider if they exhibit the following symptoms: Fever greater than 100.4° when temperature is taken by mouth; vomiting and/ or diarrhea within the last 24 hours, severe sore throat along with fever and feeling ill for more than 48 hours or after exposure to the strep throat infection; honey-crusted sores around the nose or mouth or rash on other body parts; large amounts of mucous (liquid) from your child's nose with face pain or headache; severe ear pain or fluid coming from the ear; severe headache, especially with fever.
- 5. Members of our district staff may make attendance home checks for irregularities in student attendance patterns.
- 6. We have begun implementing "RoboCalls" in regards to attendance matters (see more information below).

What is a 'RoboCall'?

In an effort to continue to find effective ways to communicate with our families, we have begun to use an automated calling system (or "RoboCall") for district emergencies, weather-related delays and/or closures, and daily student absence notifications. This program is in addition to our Ed Alert System, which sends email and/or text alert messages if you have registered on our website (<u>www.cvcsd.stier.org</u>).

In regards to daily attendance calls for students who are absent, the automated system makes calls based on a student's morning attendance as of 9:45 a.m. for CV Middle School and High School, and 10:15 a.m. for Port Dickinson and Chenango Bridge. The call goes to the primary contact's home and cell phone number. If you have called your child's absence into the attendance office or sent a note before 9:00 a.m., you should not receive a call.

As mentioned, we will also use the automated calling system for weather alerts, delays and/or closings this winter season, as well as any other district emergencies. These calls will also go to the primary contact's home and cell phone number. If you are the primary contact for the child and have signed up for alerts via our website, you may get two notifications. At this time, we will not remove primary contacts from receiving the automated attendance calls, as we are obligated to have communication when a student is absent from school with either prior notification by a parent or guardian or a call initiated by the school.

Board of Education President's Message

Fall is a time for change, and times, they certainly are a-changin. Children in 2018 are facing unique stressors. Social media compounds the already complicated ability of students to find their way. We understand the need to support our students' social-emotional development. As of July 2018, NYS requires mental health instruction be included in our health education curriculum. Chenango Valley takes this initiative, and the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), seriously. Last year, our talented social workers began training our staff in Mental Health First Aid, which gives our faculty the information and resources they need to assist students who are in distress. Educational equity is evident in our district and we work hard every day to educate the whole child.

Our school board has continued to work hard during the past couple of months. We held a work session in September to develop team norms and will conduct another one in October to develop board objectives. These sessions are imperative for us to work as a team and keep the focus on our important work. We also held many committee meetings. Our Budget, Audit and Fiscal Oversight Committee met with Insero, our auditors, who then presented the entire board another successful financial audit report for the 2017-2018 school year. Our Policy Committee met and reviewed the policies on the month's rotation. Our Educational Excellence Committee met to go over Regents data and as NYS just recently released the 3-8 data, we will be discussing those results soon. We also looked at class sizes and there is a marked improvement from last year. Lastly, we looked at the third and fourth guarter data from last school year. Solid action plans have been implemented

Our Transportation Committee met and discussed, extensively, routing and bus driver availability. We discussed this as a full board as well, and will continue to do so. District News

Capital Project Update

With the Phase 1 construction activity wrapped up for the season, the focus is now on the Phase 2 portion of the 2018 Capital Improvements project. The design portion of the project is complete and has been sent to the State Education Department for their review. Once the review is complete, a building permit can be issued. Final project details are currently being fine-tuned, as well as the anticipated construction sequencing. Major project scope items include:

Chenango Bridge Elementary School

-Classroom refurbishment -STEAM classroom upgrades -Nurse's office expansion -Corridor finish improvements -LED lighting replacement -Mechanical system improvements -Library renovation

Port Dickinson Elementary School

-Classroom refurbishment -STEAM classroom upgrades -Corridor finish improvements -LED lighting replacement -Mechanical system improvements -Library renovation

Middle School/High School

-Outdoor classroom -Library reconstruction -LED lighting replacement -Exterior door replacement -Fitness room expansion

Bus Garage

-Bus storage area expansion -Bus maintenance bay renovation -Overhead door replacement -Driver's lounge area renovation -Mechanical system upgrades -New fire alarm system

Maintenance Storage Building


-Roof replacement -Exterior wall panel replacement

We are also planning how each of the elementary schools will be vacated during construction to allow for a concentrated work effort. The elementary schools will each receive a significant facelift and work will occur throughout the entire buildings. More information will be provided in regards to vacating the buildings.

In addition, there are some funds remaining from the 2015 Capital Improvements project, so we are proceeding with replacing the exterior sign at Port Dickinson Elementary. A new digital sign, similar to those at CV Middle School/High School and Chenango Bridge Elementary, will be provided to inform the community of upcoming events and activities. The project is currently out to bid, and we are hoping the weather cooperates to allow installation this year.




Chenango Bridge Elementary Library Model

CV Alumni Receive Recognition, Inspire Future Graduates

On September 28, Chenango Valley's 2018 Hall of Fame alumni honorees and distinguished community members inspired future CV graduates during a day of events at each of our school buildings. With the help of a high school senior tour guide, each honoree was warmly welcomed and shared fun facts about themselves with our youngest Warriors at Port Dickinson Elementary, answered thoughtful questions from Chenango Bridge Elementary students, and spoke in the classrooms of CV Middle School and High School students.

After a day filled with activities, the honorees were recognized at an evening reception, hosted by the CV Alumni Association, held at The Orchard at Chenango Commons. The guests of honor were surrounded by community members, district staff, past honorees, family and friends. Proceeds from the Chenango Valley Alumni Association event will help to fund CV's Warrior Fund (to assist families in need), our CHOW pantry, and future scholarship opportunities for CV students.

Honorees of distinction included CV alumnus Hon. Robert S. Rose (Class of 1961), a retired Justice who also served in the United States Army as Commanding Officer of an intelligence unit in West Germany in 1970 and as a Captain in South Vietnam from 1971 to 1972. Gregory Stanton (Class of 1966) is a retired Susquehanna Valley teacher who became a franchisee for the McDonald's Corporation and has received recognitions for his restaurants. He has also contributed various monetary donations to academic programs, scholarships and the Ronald McDonald House. Suzanne Bennett Johnson, PhD (Class of 1966), is a distinguished research professor at Florida State University (FSU) College of Medicine who served as the 2012 President of the American Psychological Association, among additional accomplishments. Barbara Murphy Donnelly (Class of 1976) is an event planner and the business owner of House of Treasures. She is also highly involved in the newly formed non-profit "The Showers for Hope," which helps to provide a safe shower facility, clothes and food to those in need. Our distinguished community members included Catherine Reardon Fitzgerald, a CV Class of 1967 graduate, who taught at CV for over 40 years before retiring in 2015. She works as a volunteer with the Catholic Charities Food Pantry, substitute teaches for Broome County Catholic Schools and prepares weekly meals for friends and family. Our additional distinguished community members were Robert (Bob) and Mary Lou Zanot, who married in 1975 after meeting in college. Bob was a member of the University of Notre Dame's 1973 undefeated National Championship football team. He recently retired after 42 years of teaching, and began his career as an art teacher at Chenango Valley High School in 1981. He also coached 110 seasons of interscholastic sports; primarily football, basketball, and track -- and had over 300 wins as the CV boys basketball coach. Mary Lou, a CV Class of 1971 graduate, recently retired after 25 years of teaching fifth grade at Chenango Bridge Elementary. She has also helped to coach cheer and track at CV, among other contributions to the community.

District News Curriculum Corner: Spotlight on Title I

Welcome back everyone! It is great to walk around our schools and see all of our students engaged in learning! This month, I wanted to put a spotlight on Title I and the various intervention services we offer here at Chenango Valley. Title I is a federally-funded aid stream that is authorized under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). This funding is used to offset salaries of teachers in support positions like Academic Intervention Services (AIS), which allows us to work with students in small groups, providing them with the extra academic support they need. Funding is also used to purchase math and ELA support materials for the classroom.

There are a range of services that are provided under Title I and a variety of ways your child might be recommended. When considering a child for additional services, we look at multiple sources of data including NYS test scores (where appropriate), report card grades, benchmark assessments, and teacher recommendations. Students may be considered first under the building RTI (Response to Intervention) process. This involves a team of teachers and interventionists focusing on specific concerns (i.e. math facts fluency) that can be addressed right in the classroom (Tier I intervention). Depending on the area of focus, a student may also be recommended for AIS services (Tier II) that might involve an AIS teacher working in the classroom or pulling a small group of students for targeted skill work. After Tier I and Tier II strategies have been tried, Tier III services typically involve more 1:1 support and instruction.

All of these services are designed to be fluid and students should move in and out of the different tiers as their skills develop. When students are recommended for AIS services, you will be notified by a letter from the AIS teacher that will be working with your child. If you have any questions at all, please reach out to your child's classroom teacher or your building principal.

- 4. Attain 80% participation in school programs among students in grades 3-12

Bus Safety Drills Review Proper Behavior, Emergency Procedures

All CVCSD students participated in bus safety drills at the beginning of the school year. These drills included important practice for evacuating buses in the case of an emergency. If an emergency should occur, seconds count to ensure that everyone gets out quickly and safely.

In their drills, students learned about topics including safe crossing signals, ridership rules, how to properly use seat belts, what to do if a bus driver becomes disabled, and how to find and operate emergency equipment and exits.

Students also practiced using different emergency escapes including the rear exit.

In accordance with New York State Education law, bus safety drills are conducted at CV throughout the school year.

The CV Middle School Guidance Office has been busy focusing on college and career readiness. We believe that it is never too early to help students think about furthering their education and future career options. Each grade level had activities specifically designed for their level of development. In the sixth grade, Mrs. Lally helped students identify their personality color and students participated in activities that linked their color to potential careers. They also researched some post-high school educational opportunities by looking through college brochures and pamphlets. The seventh grade students completed a week-long unit with Mrs. Lally that included completing a self-evaluation and career exploration guide, researching a career of interest on Career Cruising, and creating a banner of information about a college that offers a major that could lead to that career. Mrs. Samson took the eighth grade students on virtual campus visits and had students research the colleges attended by CV staff. The eighth graders will also going on a field trip to visit SUNY Broome in early November. They will tour the campus and visit the academic buildings, library, Decker Building, Natural Science Center, and Student Center. During FACS 8, students will also explore college and careers further using Career Cruising. They will complete a research project, practice filling out job applications and participate in a mock interview.

Our goal was to involve the entire middle school in this month-long project that also featured teacher college trivia and a day for everyone to wear clothing from their favorite university. We hope that these activities have sparked conversations at home about future career options and the importance of higher education. Parents can encourage their children's career choices. They also have unique insight into the interests, values, and abilities that inform those choices. Please feel free to explore the Career Cruising program at any time. Back-to-School Tips

Connecting with Your Child's School Counselor for a Successful School Year

School counselors make a measurable impact in every student's life, assisting with academic, career and personal/social development. Professional school counselors are trained in both educating and counseling, which allows them to function as a facilitator between parents, teachers, and the student in matters concerning the student's goals, abilities, and any areas needing improvement. School counselors provide services not only to students in need, but to all students.

Meet or contact your child's school counselor. The beginning of a school year is an excellent opportunity to initiate contact with your child's school counselor and doing so can ensure your child's positive school experience. By communicating with one another, parents and counselors can have a definite impact on a child's success.

Discuss your child's challenges and concerns with the school counselor. As a parent, you know your child best. However, the school counselor can help your child as a student. It's important to encourage your child's expression of needs, hopes, and frustrations.

Learn about your child's school and social connections from the school counselor. When you need information or assistance, your child's school counselor can help you get in touch with the appropriate school officials; learn about school policies on behavior, attendance, and dress; know the school calendar of important dates; and stay connected with the school in many other ways. The school counselor can also help you locate resources in the community when you need them.

Work with the school counselor to identify resources and find solutions to problems. If your child is having a problem at school, it is important to work with your child's school counselor to find solutions. Discuss resources available within and outside of the school, and get information on how such programs can benefit your child. Your school counselor can be a valuable partner in your child's education and preparation for life beyond school.

Attention Student Athletes

As you know, the NCAA has established eligibility rules related to participating in Division I and II college athletics. Should you be considering athletics in college, it is absolutely imperative that you notify your school counselor now. Students are required to take 16 core subject courses. The NCAA does not use elective courses to complete the 16.

To participate at the Division I or II level, you also must register with the NCAA Clearinghouse by going to <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u>. Once you have registered, it will prompt you to let the guidance office know so we can submit a transcript. Finally, you must submit your SAT or ACT scores to the NCAA Eligibility Center directly from the testing agency in order to certify the student-athlete's initial eligibility. All test scores are required to be sent.

Guidance 6 Ways Students Can Clean Up Their Social Media Before College

Here are some tips from Jade McDermott, a social media specialist at Bearly Marketing published on Her Campus that your students can use to clean up their social media pages before college:

1. Make sure your pictures say something positive We know how tempting it can be to post anything and everything on social media. But, a good piece of advice is to make sure every image you post represents something good about you. Shy away from posting anything related to partying, drinking and drug usage, nudity, profanity and excess negativity. " Posting this type of content can create a negative reflection of you and can harm your chances of getting into certain colleges, internships and jobs," Mc-Dermott says. A good rule to live by is that if you have to contemplate posting it, you probably shouldn't.	2. Watch your language This one goes without saying, but it is definitely worth repeating. You never know who is scrolling through your social media pages these days, so shy away from foul language. Profanity-from racism, to sexism, to homophobia, to explicit language-that you may think is a joke can cause viewers to reconsider the great person you probably are! Jade warns pre-collegiettes that this kind of language can harm your reputation even if you are a great individual. "You may be an honor student with a good heart, but for those who don't know you personally, all they are gathering as an impression for you is what they see online," she says. "By using profanity, you can appear immature, unpolished and unprofessional."
3. Balance personal and professional Social media background checks have gained extreme prominence in the past decade. Over 45 percent of employers admit checking for their candidates on social media. The way you behave online plays a big factor in how people judge your potential in the classroom (and eventually, the workplace). But wait, you're safe if you set your profile to private, right? Accord- ing to Jade, not so much. "Keep in mind that anyone can look at your social media profiles, even if they are set to private," she says. "Many corporations (even small businesses) have access to tools and programs that can easily get around privacy settings." This is definitely beneficial to know. By keeping your online content and messaging clean and positive, you can share aspects of your personal life without worry. Jade says, "As long as you refrain from using profanity and posting anything vulgar or too negative, you really do not need to post all the details of your personal life on the internet. Trust us – a few years down the road, you will cringe at some of the things you posted!	4. Share content that is relevant to your area of study You may still be undecided about what you want to do in life, but honing in on and exploring your interests is a great way to utilize the web. It goes without saying, but social media sites like Twitter and LinkedIn are great sources for networking (at any age)! It is never too early to get started on making a name for yourself—especially in fields like communications or busi- ness. Jade is a big supporter of this. "By posting and interacting with content that is relevant to your field of study or work, you are exuding passion, interest and knowledge in that sub- ject," she says. "It is a great way to showcase your professionalism and is great for increasing your online network within your field." Networking is an essential part of making a name for yourself in any industry, and social media is a great tool for doing it!
5. Don't post about alcohol or drug use Just don't do it. Literally. Ever. In no way is this ever a good idea. Obviously, the college lifestyle comes with a lot of temptation (especially in your younger years). However, no matter how tempting it may seem to post a "funny" picture now, the repercussions will absolutely not be worth it later. In the digital age, you are your own brand. "When you post alcohol and drug usage online, you are essentially harming your image and your brand," Jade says. Some high school students may not think their online image is something to be too worried about, but according to Jade, they should rethink this. "I would explain [to these people] that they are creating a negative image of themselves and although they may not see it as a big deal, employers and colleges DQ," she says. "Posting such content can (and often does) prevent you from getting into your dream college and/or your dream job." It is truly not worth the risk.	6. Cut down your "Friends" list In high school, it was probably cool to be friends with as many people as possible on your social media profiles. However, this will have little benefit in your collegiette life. In fact, it will probably become more of an annoyance than anything else. Jade reminds pre-collegiettes that social media is a powerful tool when it comes to both school and work, so you should monitor whom you are connecting with. "By maintaining relationships and connections, you can open doors and create opportunities for yourself and others," she says. "When you have too many friends, your network may be oversaturated and creating these networking opportunities can be more difficult."

What is Jade's biggest piece of advice for social media usage? Remember the two Ps: professionalism and positivity. "Employers and colleges are very particular about who they recruit and associate with them," she says. "At the end of the day, it is simply not worth tainting your image on social media."

We are the digital generation, so our knowledge and use of social media is ever-changing. Right now and definitely before college, students should clean up those pages – it is never too early to begin planning for your future!


