Community Support Sought for Proposed Capital Project

The Chenango Valley Central School District serves as the center of our community and we have a long-standing tradition of providing our students and community with well-maintained facilities and grounds. In order to continue that tradition, the district is proposing a new capital improvements project that will be put to a public vote on December 5, 2017 at the Chenango Valley Middle School/High School Auditorium. Although we have completed a lot of work throughout the district over the past few years, there are still needs within the buildings.

The estimated total cost for this project is \$15 million, with a local tax increase of \$0. The project includes renovations, building system upgrades, and site work.

A community meeting will be held on November 6, 2017 at 6:00 p.m. in CV's MS/HS Auditorium to discuss the potential project and gather community feedback.



The project scope of work, when combined with existing project debt service, will result in no net tax levy impact (on average) for CV taxpayers.



Proposed Capital Project Q & A

Q: How will this referendum be presented to voters?

A: Voters will vote "yes" or "no" to the overall scope of proposed work. The vote will be on the full project, not individual buildings or items.

Q: If the referendum is approved, how can residents be assured the project would be kept fiscally on track?

A: By law, the district cannot exceed the amount of the public referendum once it has been approved by voters. In developing the plan, the district's architects have strived to accurately forecast the cost of materials (which continually rise).

Q: What happens if the project is not approved?

A: If voters reject the proposed plan in December, the district's space and facilities issues would still need to be addressed. In fact, many items included in this project are priorities that need to be addressed soon for health and safety reasons. If these items are funded through the district's regular budget rather than in the capital project, they may not receive as much state aid, which would cost local taxpayers substantially more.

Q: Instead of funding a capital improvements project, why don't we use this money for educational programming, like additional technology or music programs?

A: Capital projects are funded through a different source than our regular annual school budget. Curriculum programming cannot be funded out of a capital project budget. Capital improvement projects, like this one, are eligible for state aid reimbursement from New York State. Our district is eligible to receive up to 83.4% back on every dollar spent. If the district completed capital project items through our annual school budget, we would lose our district's portion of allocated state aid.

New Visitor Management Systems

As part of our security upgrades in the Chenango Valley Central School District, we have purchased new visitor management systems. These systems allow us to scan an ID and print a photo badge for visitors coming to each of our school buildings. Readers are now in place at each school.



Since the first day of classes, it has become a requirement for all visitors to show photo identification in order to enter our buildings. Although the new system and security vestibules have required adjustments to some of our practices and procedures, we feel it's a critical step to increase the security for our students.

Thank you all for your ongoing cooperation in working with the district. We appreciate your help in ensuring the safety of our students. We encourage you to continue sharing questions, concerns, and ideas with your building principals.

Emergency Alert System

The district uses an automated system to quickly send messages to parents/guardians in the event of a school or district emergency. Messages will be sent in the form of an email and/or text to your cell phone. The system does not currently make voice telephone calls.

To receive messages, you will need to have an account on our district website:

- 1. Go to www.cvcsd.stier.org.
- 2. Select "Public Login" at the top right-hand corner of the page (black bar).
- 3. Log in and/or create a new account.
- 4. Select the notification preferences you would like to receive: Emergency Alerts, Athletics, etc. Choose one or more schools from the list to receive notifications pertaining just to that school. To receive notifications for district-wide emergencies, which include weather-related school closings, select "Emergency Alerts/Closing and Delay".

We encourage you to check and make sure you're signed up. If your contact information has changed, please update your contact information in the system as needed to ensure you receive notifications. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact Mrs. Latimer at Slatimer@cvcsd.stier.org.



Full STEAM Ahead

We're off to a busy start in the STEAM classrooms. We welcomed our new technology teacher Mr. Case in the middle school over the summer and put him to work right away!

This year, Mrs. Tronovitch will be in the Port Dickinson STEAM room full-time, working with grades K-2 to begin problem solving and learning about the scientific method. Kindergarten experimented with mixing primary colors, first grade experimented to see how many drops of water a penny could hold, and second grade experimented using chromatography (the separation of a mixture) to see what colors made up the black ink in a Mr. Sketch marker.

Mrs. Mika will be at Chenango Bridge Elementary full-time this year, working with grades 3-5. Third grade found out how challenging folding paper could be as they made and tested paper airplanes to find the design that would go the farthest! Fourth grade has worked hard on designing marble mazes... we may have some budding game designers. Fifth grade teamed up to create devices to launch a piece of candy at a target, hitting it but not knocking it down!

At the secondary level, our eighth graders were working hard on their measurement skills to help them be precise as they began projects. They practiced with tape measures and rulers and focused on fractional inches. "Measure twice, cut once!"

Finally, our high school students are excited to take a new class called 'Intro to Robotics' in the spring semester. The class will focus on engineering careers, programming and problem solving with an end-of-the-year robotics competition at SUNY Broome. Matt Klein and Jacob Tester are pictured showing off one of our new VEX robots below. The STEAM club has graduated to the VEX robots to be able to join some more complex competitions. We'll be there to support them!



A New Use for Old Desks

Eighth grade math teacher Jim Stocum and his wife Becky recently repurposed two wooden desks into chess tables. The desks were very old, falling apart, and on the verge of being discarded. Mr. Stocum saw another use for them. The Stocums redesigned the desks as tables, sanded them, and painted chess boards on top of each. They then gave them back to the district.

One table was given to Mrs. Walsh and her chess club at Chenango Bridge Elementary in honor of long-time chess advisor Bill Hazilla. The other table has been placed in Mr. Stocum's classroom to be used by both the middle and high school chess clubs.

Title I, Parents' Right-to-Know Notification Letter Required by No Child Left Behind Legislation

To Port Dickinson, Chenango Bridge and Chenango Valley Middle School Parents/Guardians,

Upon request parents of students attending Title I schools – Port Dickinson, Chenango Bridge and Chenango Valley Middle School - may request information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's teachers, and paraprofessional staff.

Please call the Board Office at 762-6810 should you want information regarding:

A. whether the teacher has met State qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction;

B. whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which State qualification or licensing criteria have been waived;

C. the baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification or degree; and

D. whether the child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications.

Then too, should Chenango Valley's Title I schools – Port Dickinson, Chenango Bridge and/or Chenango Valley Middle School be identified for school improvement, corrective action and/or restructuring, letters would be sent to parents which would include:

A. An explanation of what the identification means and how the school compares to other schools in terms of achievement.

- B. The reason(s) for identification
- C. How the problem is being addressed
- D. How parents can help
- E. The option to transfer to another public school

This letter is to satisfy the NCLB (No Child Left Behind) parent notification requirements should Port Dickinson, Chenango Bridge or Chenango Valley Middle; School be identified as a Title I School in Need of Improvement, or Title I Corrective Action.

Public Notice regarding asbestos

The Chenango Valley Central School District completes inspection of all schools and buildings to determine the condition of asbestos that is present, and whether any action is required to avoid potential health hazards for students, employees and visitors.

A management plan has been developed in accordance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), to ensure the continued provision and maintenance of a safe environment for students, employees and visitors. The management plan includes training of maintenance staff to prevent disturbance of asbestos, periodic re-inspection, surveillance, and limited abatement by trained personnel.

Please note that the comprehensive, triennial inspection occurs once every three years. A surveillance inspection of the asbestos containing building materials occurs every six months, typically during the months of December and July. Monitoring of these building materials occurs on a continuing basis.

Chenango Valley Central School District Request for Pesticide Application Notification

New York State Education Law Section 409-H and State Education Department Commissioner's Regulation 155.24, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

Chenango Valley Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior notification of certain pesticide applications.

SECTION III - Policy No. 7 - Anti-Harassment for Employees - Protected Class

Anti-Harassment for Employees - Protected Class

- Chenango Valley Central School District ("district") recognizes the harmful and insidious nature of harassment on the basis of a protected characteristic (i.e., race, color, national origin, religion, age, disability, sexual orientation, and/or veteran status) ("harassment") and the toll that harassment can have on employees, staff, students, vendors, and visitors to the district's buildings, grounds, and facilities.
- The district is fully committed to maintaining a work environment that is free from all forms of harassment and discrimination that are prohibited by law.
- In keeping with this commitment, the district will not tolerate any harassment that occurs at school, school-related functions, on school grounds, or on school transportation, whether perpetrated by or against the district's employees, staff, vendors, or visitors to the district's buildings, grounds, or facilities.
- The district prohibits all forms of harassment in all areas of employment including, by way of example, recruitment, hiring, training, promotion, discipline, separations, benefits, and compensation.
- Any employee, agent, or official of the district who has experienced or witnessed behavior which the employee, in good faith, believes is harassment should immediately report said harassment to a supervisor, an assistant principal, a principal, the Assistant Superintendent or the Superintendent.
- The district will promptly investigate all reports of harassment and, pursuant to the results of said investigation, will take appropriate disciplinary and/or corrective action that is in accordance with applicable laws, rules, regulations, and/or collective bargaining agreements.
- The district prohibits any retaliation against employees who have made good faith reports of harassment or who have participated in any investigation of harassment complaints.

Harassment on the Basis of a Protected Characteristic

It is the district's policy to provide a work environment that is free from all forms of harassment and discrimination that are prohibited by law (i.e., harassment that targets race, color, national origin, religion, age, disability, sexual orientation, and/or veteran status) ("harassment"). This policy applies to the actions of supervisors, co-workers, vendors, students, parents, and visitors to the district's buildings, grounds, and facilities.

Harassment on the basis of any protected characteristic is strictly prohibited by law and this policy. Under this policy, harassment is verbal or physical conduct that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion toward an individual because of his/her race, color, religion, national origin, age, disability (alienage or citizenship status, marital status, creed, genetic disposition or carrier status, sexual orientation) or any other characteristic protected by law or that of his/her relatives, friends, or associates, and that: (i) has the purpose or effect of creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work environment; (ii) has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work performance; or (iii) otherwise adversely affects an individual's employment opportunities

Harassing conduct includes, but is not limited to:

- epithets, slurs, name-calling, negative stereotyping, or offensive "slang";
- threatening, intimidating, or hostile acts;
- denigrating jokes and/or displays or circulation in the workplace of any written or graphic material (such as signs, pictures, or cartoons) that denigrates, intimidates an individual, or shows hostility or aversion toward an individual or group (including through e-mail);
- pushing, shoving, threats, or other intentional acts perpetrated in whole or in part because of the victim's protected status;
- mimicking or mocking another's speech, accent, disability, or behavior.

Each manager/supervisor has a responsibility to maintain a workplace that is free of harassment. Harassing conduct in the workplace, whether committed by managers/supervisors, non-managerial employees, co-workers, or outside individuals (vendors, visitors to the school, etc.), is strictly prohibited.

Scope of Policy

This policy covers conduct in the workplace, at social functions (i.e., holiday dinners, picnics, sporting events, etc.), and business functions.

Timely Reporting

An important objective of this policy is to prevent the development of a work environment which, because of prohibited conduct, unreasonably interferes with an employee's work or is intimidating, hostile, or offensive. It is therefore essential and required that employees immediately report conduct which they believe is in violation of this policy. Such timely reporting is necessary so that a complaint can be investigated while information is most available, so that a problem can be remedied before a harassing situation develops, and so that the district can avoid the spread of harmful rumors.

Any employee, agent, or official of the district who believes that he or she has been subjected to conduct in violation of this policy should report the facts of the incident and the name of the individuals involved to his/her immediate supervisor or, in the alternative, to the Assistant Superintendent. If, for any reason, an employee, agent, or official of the district would prefer not to make the report to these individuals, the employee should report the conduct to the Superintendent. Similarly, any employee who observes the harassment of another employee, agent, official, vendor, or visitor of the district's buildings or grounds should report the harassment to one of the persons listed above.

Complaint Procedure

If a complainant is comfortable addressing the situation directly and believes it would be helpful, the employee is encouraged to immediately tell the other person when his/her behavior is considered inappropriate and unwelcome and to request that the conduct stop. Persons so told must comply immediately and graciously with such requests.

Supervisors must immediately report to the Assistant Superintendent conduct that is believed to be in violation of this policy, whether or not the concerned parties are subordinates of the supervisor and whether or not the conduct is reported to the supervisor.

Investigation of Complaints

The district's policy is to investigate all reported incidents thoroughly, promptly, and in a discrete manner. The district recognizes that every investigation requires a determination based on all of the facts in the matter. The district also recognizes the serious impact that a false accusation can have and trust that all employees, agents, and officials will act responsibly when making complaints.

Sanctions for Violations of this Policy

The district expects all employees to be aware of this policy and to abide by it at all times. If an investigation confirms that harassment has taken place, the district will take appropriate corrective and/or disciplinary action in accordance with the applicable laws, rules, regulations, and collective bargaining agreements. Such corrective and/or disciplinary action may include counseling, reprimand, suspension, and/or the termination of the offending party's employment.

Bad Faith Complaints

Although the district encourages the reporting of harassment, employees, agents, and officials must recognize that complaints made in bad faith (such as when the complainant knows that the complaint is false) can have a serious impact on other employees and officials, who may experience adverse employment action and also suffer a compromise in their reputation. In addition, bad faith complaints disrupt the workplace and waste resources by triggering lengthy and (potentially) time-consuming investigations.

It is therefore misconduct, under this policy, for an employee, agent, or official to make complaints of harassment in bad faith, and doing so may result in corrective or disciplinary action taken against the complainant. For the purposes of this policy, complaints are made in "bad faith" when the complainant: (a) makes the complaint solely to harm, injure, degrade, defame, or embarrass another person; (b) knows that the complaint is false; and/or (c) acts with reckless disregard to the truth when making the complaint.

Confidentiality

When investigating harassment complaints, the district will maintain confidentiality to the extent that the district considers practicable, appropriate, and necessary in order to meet the purposes of investigating and responding to the complaint and in order to achieve the other objectives of this policy.

District

Retaliation is Strictly Prohibited

The district strictly prohibits any supervisor, employee, agent, or official from retaliating against anyone who makes a good faith report of harassment or who participates in an investigation under this policy. Any supervisor, employee, agent, or official who violates this provision will be subjected to appropriate discipline in accordance with applicable laws, rules, regulations, and collective bargaining agreements. Such discipline may include counseling, reprimand, suspension, and/or termination of employment.

Responsibility

Supervisors are responsible for strict compliance with all aspects of this policy. Therefore, they should review the manner and style in which they oversee their subordinates and the quality of the workplace environment they create through their supervision. In particular, supervisors should take pains not to condone or tolerate any conduct that might violate this policy.

Waiver

Any failure by an employee, agent, or official to report any incidents of sexual harassment may result in the full waiver of the claim.

Publication

The district shall promulgate this policy as follows:

A copy of this policy shall be provided to each employee, agent, or official on the first payday of each September. With respect to an employee, agent, or official who is hired during the school year, this policy shall be provided to the employee, agent, or official after the Board of Education has appointed the employee, agent, or official.

This policy shall be published annually in the district's newsletter. This policy shall also be provided annually to the president of each bargaining unit.

Policy Review

The district shall, on an annual basis, provide for a review of this policy with all of its employees, agents, and officials.

Back-to-School Tips Connecting with Your Child's School Counselor for a Successful School Year

School counselors make a measurable impact in every student's life, assisting with academic, career and personal/social development. Professional school counselors are trained in both educating and counseling, which allows them to function as a facilitator between parents, teachers, and the student in matters concerning the student's goals, abilities, and any areas needing improvement. School counselors provide services not only to students in need, but to all students.

Meet or contact your child's school counselor. The beginning of a school year is an excellent opportunity to initiate contact with your child's school counselor and doing so can ensure your child's positive school experience. By communicating with one another, parents and counselors can have a definite impact on a child's success.

Discuss your child's challenges and concerns with the school counselor. As a parent, you know your child best. However, the school counselor can help your child as a student. It's important to encourage your child's expression of needs, hopes, and frustrations.

Learn about your child's school and social connections from the school counselor. When you need information or assistance, your child's school counselor can help you get in touch with the appropriate school officials; learn about school policies on behavior, attendance, and dress; know the school calendar of important dates; and stay connected with the school in many other ways. The school counselor can also help you locate resources in the community when you need them.

Work with the school counselor to identify resources and find solutions to problems. If your child is having a problem at school, it is important to work with your child's school counselor to find solutions. Discuss resources available within and outside of the school, and get information on how such programs can benefit your child. Your school counselor can be a valuable partner in your child's education and preparation for life beyond school.

Attention Student Athletes

As you know, the NCAA has established eligibility rules related to participating in Division I and II college athletics. Should you be considering athletics in college, it is absolutely imperative that you notify your school counselor now. Students are required to take 16 core subject courses. The NCAA does not use elective courses to complete the 16.

To participate at the Division I or II level, you also must register with the NCAA Clearing house at www.eligibilitycenter.org. Once you have registered, it will prompt you to let the guidance office know to submit a transcript. Finally, you must submit your SAT or ACT scores to the NCAA Eligibility Center directly from the testing agency in order to certify the initial eligibility of the student athlete. All test scores are required to be sent.

Please Note: Some eligibility rules have changed for students graduating after 2016. Please see your counselor for details.



Help Promote Good Student Attendance




Getting your child to school on-time, every day, unless they are sick, is something that you can do to ensure your child has a chance to succeed in school. While others can help, you are the bottom line. You can promote good attendance when you:

- Establish and stick to the basic routines (going to bed early, waking up on time, etc.) that will help your child develop the habit of ontime attendance.
- Talk to your child about why going to school every day is critical and important unless they are sick. If your child seems reluctant to go to school, find out why and work with the teacher, administrator or after-school provider to get them excited about going to school.
- Come up with back-up plans for who to turn to (another family member, a neighbor or fellow parents) to help you get your child to school if something comes up (e.g. another child gets sick, your car breaks down, etc.).
- Reach out for help if you are experiencing tough times (e.g. transportation, unstable housing, loss of a job, health problems) that make it difficult to get your child to school. Other parents, your child's teacher, principal, social worker, school nurse, after-school providers or community agencies can help you problem solve or connect

you to a needed resource.

• If your child is absent, work with the teacher to make sure she or he has an opportunity to learn and make up for the academics missed.

Activities Build Teamwork Skills Among Middle School Students

CV social worker Mrs. Hubenthal, along with guidance counselors Mrs. Samson and Mrs. Lally, spent time with each middle school physical education class in the beginning of the school year.

Students learned about the role of the guidance office and discussed ways to help each other out.

Students also took part in team-building activities including working in groups to write a positive message using multiple strands of duct tape tied to a single marker. Students discovered that when it comes to a challenge, working as a supportive team can help you find the best solution.

Bus Safety Drills Review Proper Behavior, Emergency Procedures



All CVCSD students participated in bus safety drills at the beginning of the school year. These drills included important practice for evacuating buses in the case of an emergency. If an emergency should occur, seconds count to ensure that everyone gets out quickly and safely.

In their drills, students learned about topics including safe crossing signals, ridership rules, how to properly use seat belts, what to do if a bus driver becomes disabled, and how to find and operate emergency equipment and exits.

Students also practiced using different emergency escapes including the rear exit (as seen on the left).

In accordance with New York State Education law, bus safety drills are conducted at CV three times during the school year. Safety drills will also be conducted at the end of November and in early spring.






Fun Learning Activities Tie Into New Lucy Calkins' Writing Program






Sixth Graders Write Letters to Their Future Selves
